
Your Part in Preventing Wildfires

Due to recent high winds, please be aware of the different levels of fire warnings issued by the National Weather Service. A Red Flag Warning is issued for weather events that may result in extreme fire behavior that will occur within 24 hours. A Fire Weather Watch is issued when a weather conditions could exist in the next 12 to 72 hours.

A Red flag Warning is the highest alert. During these times, the public is urged to by extremely cautious, because a simple spark could cause a major wildfire. A Fire Watch is one level below a warning, but a fire danger is still high. Factors that influence the spread of wild fires are:


- Weather (Wind, Temperature, and Relative Humidity), Fuel, and Topography.
- Wind increases the rate and the direction of the spread of fire.
- Relative Humidity and Temperature mainly effect fuel.

Types of Weather Pattern that cause a watch or warning include low relative humidity, strong winds, dry fuels, the possibility of dry lightings strikes, or any combination.





- Dispose of smoking materials in an appropriate container and make sure it is completely extinguished. Do not throw these items into any open area as they may start a fire that will spread rapidly.
- Do not throw cigars or cigarettes out of your vehicle when traveling.
- Do not burn or trash without appropriate approval from your local fire department.
- Proceed with caution when using outside grills or cooking equipment during these times. If you must use outside cooking equipment, make sure you have some type of extinguishing agent nearby (e.g., water hose, bucket of sand, fire extinguisher).



Hobbs Police Department Citizens' Police Academy

Another round of the HPD Citizens' Police Academy has begun and is now in its 7th week, with 31 students. So far, the class has gained in-depth education on law, crime scene investigations, domestic violence, K9 units, and other law enforcement topics. The program lasts for 10 weeks and is open to all who wish to participate. Throughout the course, students gain hands on experience on how to use a speed radar gun, how to identify someone who is past the legal alcohol intoxication level to drive, and even get to solve a crime with HPD's own Crime Scene Technicians.

The course is coordinated by Officer Mike Stone with help from many other members of the Hobbs Police Department and the City of Hobbs Legal Department. There are two courses offered throughout the year, one in the Fall and one in the Spring. New Designated Parking Spaces

The City of Hobbs installed 15 reserved parking signs for the Combat Wounded Warriors in our community. The signs have been placed in front of parking spaces near the entrance of City Hall and other city facilities in Hobbs. Many Iraq and Afghanistan War veterans have returned to the States with injuries uncommon in previous wars; due to advances in body armor and battlefield medicine practices, these soldiers have been able to survive the injuries they've endured. On return, they quietly flow back into civilian life without asking for any benefits. These reserved parking signs are a small token of our respect and appreciation for those in our midst who have given priceless sacrifices to protect our freedoms.

Other new designated parking spaces at City Hall and other City facilities include "Residents" and "Guests of Hobbs Parking" and "Wounded Warrior Parking." The last one is to celebrate each month's recipient of the Warrior Award for their excellence at going above and beyond in the workplace as well as in the community.



Health Wellness Learning Center Update

The City Parks and Rec Department is going to be a lot busier come Summer of 2018. That is when completion of the Health Wellness Learning Center (HWLC) is expected. So don't be alarmed when you begin to see a large circular centerpiece go up, along with an indoor track, indoor therapy and recreation pools with water slides, fitness class rooms, weight room, study and meeting rooms, and other amenities to satisfy the different groups expected to gather here.

For a city with a class of nursing graduates ranked number one in the nation, extra curricular and athletic achievements advancing to the next level at the end of every season, and an increased enrollment rate at the colleges, it is evident that our area needs an amenity to provide a place for fitness, relaxation, study, and gathering in one location. As our community members grow and evolve, so must our community. The HWLC will also serve as an event venue and a location for athletic events to be held. Expected activities and classes to be held range from yoga to spinning and many other types of leagues and classes. Our community members deserve something like this for all of their hard work and achievements.

Construction is to begin this Summer of 2016. A meaningful partnership between Hobbs Municipal Schools, the J.F Maddox Foundation, New Mexico Junior College, University of the Southwest, and the City of Hobbs is making this \$62 million project a reality and something to considerably increase the quality of life in Hobbs, New Mexico.



City Park Improvements

The City of Hobbs (City) and the Hobbs Municipal Schools (HMS) are pleased to announce a special funding partnership that will result in major renovations to City Park. Several years ago, in connection with the plans to construct Murray Elementary School, HMS and the City each reserved \$250,000 in capital funds to improve City Park in anticipation of greater use of the facility as a result of the location of Murray Elementary next it. Subsequently, the J. F Maddox Foundation (Foundation) indicated an interest in participating in this project to expand the level of improvements that might be made to the park.

Last year, the City engaged Wilson & Company to explore possible options for significantly upgrading City Park. This experienced engineering and architectural firm has worked with the City, HMS, and the Foundation in developing a Master Plan. During this process, the City reached out to area residents for their input. The resulting Master Plan provides for significant improvements to City Park, which include exciting new features that will accommodate the varied interests of people of all ages. Among the improvements planned are additional gathering/picnic areas, new athletic courts, a large splash pad, new restrooms, and additional parking. Further, the planned improvements will result in a much more attractive park that will complement the many significant improvements that have been made in the area neighboring the Park. Based on the Master Plan, the Foundation has agreed to provide \$3,740,000 in funding in support of this project.


National Library Week!



National Library Week will be from April 10th-16th this year, and the Hobbs Public Library is gearing up for it! In celebration of the occasion, the Hobbs Public Library will be hosting multiple special events and activities for individuals of all ages to partake in, in addition to the programs regularly held there such as the Young Adults Program.

The Children's Department Staff will be displaying a variety of storybooks on Tumble Books, which are electronic books, also known as e-books. These will be held in the Story Hour Room on Friday of National Library Week (April 15th). Children of all ages are welcome, although the e-books are targeted at K-5th graders. On April 6th and 7th, the United States Golf Association (USGA) sent a filming crew to Hobbs, New Mexico to catch the beauty and success thus far of Rockwind Community Links. Since inception, the staffs of the facility, as well as the City of Hobbs, have worked diligently to accomplish the concept of "community links," and the USGA has embraced this concept and believes it may be the catalyst for growing the game of golf.

Rockwind has received numerous awards and accolades in the months leading up to the USGA visit, with one magazine calling Rockwind "the future of golf." In light of declining participation rates, the USGA is excited by the concept. The project of filming a piece on Rockwind came about after a presentation about Rockwind Community Links given by Hobbs City Manager, J.J. Murphy, and course architect, Andy Staples, at a USGA Symposium in January. The idea of still keeping golf as the center of such a facility but bringing in activities that either haven't been incorporated at a course before or not in the same way contributes to the concept. That has made such a positive impact on our community, as well as to the success of Rockwind. This was the theme of J.J.'s presentation which caught USGA leaders' attention.

"The Community Links concept is helping to shine a light on the value that a well-conceived, well-run golf facility can provide to the community," said Hunki Yun, the USGA's director of partnerships, outreach and education. "Thanks to the vision of the city of Hobbs, Rockwind can serve as a model for other municipalities that are looking to use golf to offer numerous benefits to their residents."

Rockwind has an open atmosphere and numerous activities made available for golfers and non-golfers of all ages, making it a gathering place for groups and individuals of all types and interests to come to. Now, others around the nation will learn about the 9-Hole Par 3 Course and 18-hole Championship Course, the jogging trail, the numerous types of golf classes and clinics for golfers at all stages, the reservation types made available for weddings and other special events, and the relaxing patio as well as indoor dining experiences at Rockwind Grill.

The filming crew's visit, made by Rob Cowen and Rob Rabena, consisted of numerous on-camera interviews given by various supporters of Rockwind. The Mayor, City Manager, participants in the Couples Program on Wednesday nights, children and their parents of the First Tee Program of Southeastern New Mexico at Rockwind, and of course Rockwind Golf Pros Linda Howell and Camren Bergman all delivered positive comments. With beautiful weather and an active schedule, Rockwind shone in all its glory both days, giving the crew the perfect opportunity to catch the well-known sunsets and sunrises that Southeastern New Mexico manifests. The crew also took many shots of both courses, but also of some of the local surrounding attractions, such as Harry McAdams Park, the 9/11 Memorial, and the jogging trail along Lovington Highway.

After seeing how this concept has not only sustained itself but thrived, the USGA is now presenting Rockwind Community Links to golf courses and industry insiders across the nation as a model for how golf courses should now be developed and managed. The success and honor that Rockwind has attained is something unforeseeable but well-received, with J.J. Murphy stating, "It is a major privilege for the USGA to acknowledge and highlight Rockwind Community Links in such a way. To be showcased as a model for how golf possibly could be developed and managed is sure to bring many more accolades for Rockwind, and we were happy to accommodate the filming crew and thank them for all of their hard work in getting our message out."

New Bathrooms at MLK Complex

Due to numerous requests from parents of soccer participants at Martin Luther King, Jr. Complex, the City of Hobbs added a second restroom facility to the complex. The facility holds two stalls for women and two stalls for men, making a total of four new stalls. The new restrooms were placed on the east side of the complex in order to shorten the trek from the east side of the complex to the existing restrooms. MLK Complex is used year-round with both Fall and Spring seasons. In addition to the new restroom facility, new entrance steps, parking spaces, and lighting were added to the east side of the complex, and concrete repairs and new hand rails and hand rail repairs were also done to the complex. The lighting on the walking trail that surrounds the fields was upgraded to LED lighting, which aligns with the LED lighting upgrades that are being made throughout City

of Hobbs buildings and facilities. The overall cost of the additions and repairs made at MLK Complex is just over \$300,000, and these will be complete with the help of several contracted companies.



Code Enforcement Officer, Isabel Torres, had gone above and beyond her line of duty. The most recent is a complaint she received regarding some abandoned dogs. She had intended to get a search warrant for the property so that we could insure the dogs were alive. According to the complaint, the animals had been in the house for over 3 weeks without anyone helping them. The implications were that the dog owners locked the dogs in the house and left town. Isabel, rightfully, decided that she needed to do a deeper investigation into the issue before she obtained a warrant to enter and search the property. Her investigation revealed that the owners had not abandoned the dogs as previously reported but were in the hospital in Lubbock. She was able to contact the owner, who returned to Hobbs briefly to meet Isabel and photograph the dogs. She

reported that all dogs were healthy. She was able to alleviate the concerns of neighbors in the process. All this was done without jumping to conclusions or operating on assumptions. This is important because she took the time to conduct a thorough investigation, and even went above and beyond to protect the property rights of this particular dog owner and prevent a broken door. Throughout the whole process, Isabel kept in contact with the neighbors and let them know that the City was taking care of it.
